Introduction

Surgical Procedure

You have been referred to have a skin lesion removed. You will be asked several questions before the procedure including your medication history. You will be given instructions if you are on warfarin.

The doctor or nurse performing the surgery will either confirm or ask for your written consent. You should only give this if you have completely understood the procedure. The doctor or nurse will be happy to repeat the information and to answer any questions.

Local anaesthetic by injection will be given to numb the skin where the lesion is to be removed. It may be necessary to stitch the skin afterwards to help speed up the healing process. A dressing will be applied to the wound.

The lesion will be removed by cutting the skin. The skin sample will be sent to the appropriate laboratory where it will be examined.

Occasionally the site may ooze afterwards. Please press firmly with clean tissue for 10 minutes and the bleeding should stop.

Guidance for Patients

Risks and Precautions

You will be left with a scar. This is usually 2-3 times as long as the original lesion. The scar will initially be red in colour but will fade to white with time.

In the chest area there is a slightly increased risk of developing a thick and raised (keloid) scar which may need additional treatment.

Caring for Your Wound

If the wound becomes painful, red, inflamed or is weeping, please contact your GP or practice nurse as soon as possible as this can be the clinical signs for infection.

If you have not heard from us after 6 weeks of your surgery, then please contact the Dermatology Secretaries.
