The Jephson Dermatology Centre – Punch Biopsies

Introduction

You have been referred to have a skin biopsy (sample) taken. This will help the consultant to confirm a diagnosis or gather information that will help contribute to a diagnosis.

Guidance for Patients

Punch Biopsy

This procedure requires a small sample of skin to be removed and sent to the appropriate laboratory where it will be examined. A histology report will be written within 6 weeks and then reviewed by your Dermatologist.

The Procedure

You will be asked questions before the procedure including your medication history. The doctor or nurse performing the punch biopsy will either confirm or ask for your written consent. You should only give this if you have completely understood the procedure. The doctor or nurse will be happy to repeat the information and to answer any questions.

Local anaesthetic by injection will be given to numb the skin where the biopsy will be taken. A sample of skin will then be removed using a small instrument. It may be necessary to stitch the skin afterwards to help speed up the healing process. A dressing will be applied to the wound.

Risks and Precautions

Once the punch biopsy has been performed, you will be left with a red scar. However this will fade to white with time. If the biopsy has been taken from your chest there is a slight increased risk of developing a thick and raised (keloid) scar which may need additional treatment. If there is a potential risk the consultant will discuss it with you before the procedure takes place.

Although we will ensure the wound site has stopped bleeding, occasionally the site can ooze post-operatively. If this should occur please press the wound site firmly with clean tissue for 10 minutes and the bleeding should stop.

There is a small risk that the wound may become infected. However, to minimize this we have included a paragraph in this leaflet regarding the after care of your wound site.

Should you experience any of these side effects or have any concerns, please contact your GP practice Nurse or the Dermatology Department using the details on the back of this information leaflet.

Do take pain relief if you experience any discomfort eg. Paracetamol.

Caring for your wound

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Keep the wound site dry. Remove dressing after Clean biopsy site with water. Any additional information

Important Points to Remember

If the wound becomes painful, red, inflamed or is weeping, please contact your GP or practice nurse as soon as possible as this can be the clinical signs for infection.

Appointments

An appointment will be sent out in the post should the Dermatologist wish to see you following their review of your biopsy result. Otherwise you will receive the results in a letter.

If you have not received your biopsy result (written or a phone call) within 6 weeks of your biopsy, then please contact the Dermatology Secretaries.
